A few cen-turies would have ended in a complete depop-ulation of the continent, without the intrusion of one white man with the destructive viceand inventions of Europian civilization. It is susceptible of proof that the "Indian" popula-tion of America is now greater than it would have been, if that race had been left to the undisturbed influence of natural causes, which disturbed nathence of natural causes, which were in destructive operation upon them at the time of the first irruption of the "Pale faces." The devestating epidemics, so frequently and so mortally prevalent among the present and recent white population of the country, ((the lung fever, spotted fever, typhus fever, dy-n tery, &c. &c.,) swept off "hole tribes at once in those times, without an attempt at internal medication.

At may seem strange to many, but, with the exception of the vepor bath and one or two other rude and perilous external processes, no remedial agent whatever was ever known or imagined by any Indian tribe within the present bounds of these States until the white man came among them. This may seem strange to the multilude who have heard and read so much quock stuff about "Indian remedies," and "Indian doctors," but it is nevertheless a fact, ascertained by most careful and critical investigation.

Without altempting to trace these desirative peculiaraties any further now,—look at the position of the African as he stands, in this view, on his own proper continent.

The negro, in Africa, lives in fixed habitations, by regular industry, in the laborious cultivation of the soil, by the mechanic, agis, and by commerce. The executions to this general by commerce. The exceptions to this agenera fact can hardly be named. He has, from the immemorial, produced iron and gold from their native ores, and wrought them into mumerous native ores, and wrought them into mumerous forms adapted to utility and ornament,—has converted the skins of animals into leather,—has, cultivated cotton and manufactured it into cloth; and in ingenuity, durability, and (often) in elegance, these fabrics are not surpassed—rarely equalled—by the varied contrivances of European and American art. And the further the inquiries of "civilized" men have reached into regions remote from the previous visitations of white men, the nearer perfection have the negroe seen found in these essential arts of civilized life.

Where has yet been discovered the aboriginal American blacksmith, tanner or weaver, uninstructed by white men? Among the Mexicans and Peruvians, workers in gold were, numerous, and under the domination and instruction of the Aztees, the former showed great skill in jevolry and some sade power in architecture and perhaps in scripture; but a more tecture and perhaps in sculpture; but a mor helpless, feeble people never yet presented themselves to an invader.

Among the native Africans, woman is always influential and respected—the mother having almost absolute power as to the disposal of he children; and in all her labors in the field she is preceded and isded and followed by the man who claims her services, and profits by them only in just proportion to the part which he performs in them.

The chase and fishing are only incidental and adventitious means the subsistence with the African negro. For his fregular subsistence he refless upon the produce of the soil and hoon mechanical labor, aided by the gains of trai-

All these things, he accomplishes in the midst of a continual struggle against the deadly influences of a climate scercely less hostile to himself than to the white man who has so long vainly sought to invade it, and dispossess him of it. When sick, he knows how to seek in the lants of the exuberant soil on which the sub plants of the extuerant soil on which he sub-sists, remedies which furnish at some times a partial relief. If he mingles with a "legitimate practice of medicine" some foolery in the shape of witchfraft or "fettshism," he but shape thereby his kinship to that intense cultivation of the superior race which invariably tends to the prosperity, and gainfulness of humbug and

quackery.
That the African is capable of being made services its as a stare, while the Indian is not is clearly an evidence of the superior capacity of the former. An Indian is good for nothing incapable of being useful, either to immedian others. He is one of a race progress we only to self extinction, while the negro race, in Alrica or America, is quite as likely to endure as

the white.

In the attributed peculiar ennouling traits, in windictive remembrance of tojuries, and taithful enduring gratitude for favors and benefits the native African is even the superior of the American Indian, with all his vaunted revengeduiness and fidelity. No man who has ever lived among the Africans would ever dare to atrike one of them a single blow, excess the entering and the performance of the control of the arriac one of index a single clow, aniess the general sense of the negro community around him acknowledged the sufficiency of the provo-cation. For an unjust personal assault, or for a fife taken under any orcumstances, a mortal revenge is there so certain that no man who has ever committed such an outrage on a free native African, now lives any where to say that

Never was retribution so desaily and uniform as the which has fallen upon every such otherder, out the remotest parts of the coast, and even after an interval of years.

In frespitality and generosity to unprotected strangers the native Africans have an superior; within the writer's knowlesse, no equal: Witness—innumerable grateful remembrances of experience of their kindness, when there could have been no expectation of a return of it!

There is no virtue, no capacity, no gift—ever attributed to the American Indian, which the African negro, ancorrupted by slavery or "cive African negro, incorrupted by slavery or civi-uilization," does not possess in a far superior de-gree. This is asserted from some knowledge outsofth.
