He says, that he "has experienced great inconvenience in the use of the round notes." and probably others -- we see they are fully pro-Now we would like to knew in what particular, it is more inconvenient to obtain a thore uppropriate missives, from the cheapest to the knowledge of music by using the round notes: than by using the buckwheat noter.
