Death of Elizabeth Ortz. For near two months she has been suffering the most excrutiating agony. Occasionally, for a day or two, she would be comparatively easy, and then again her sufferings were so terrible that her shrieks could be heard over the neighborhood. | Several weeks after the accident her leg commenced discharging through one of the openings made in the flesh by the fractured bone, and continued without intermission until the time of her death, which was on Friday evening last. We understand that she expressed herself resigned to her death, and looked forward to the period of her dissolution as the termination of her suffering, and the entrance into happier life.

This sad accident should be a solemn varning to our Borough authorities .-How they can look upon a calamity of this kind, as the consequence of the daily neglect of their duty, and still continue to neglect it, is more than we can comprehend. If the young woman had lived and recovered, a suit should have been brought against the borough for damages. and we have no doubt that a heavy ver dict would have been given in her favor. But the magnitude of the calamity pro bably saves our town from a merited pun ishment-for it would be an insult to humanity to talk of measuring the loss of life by damages in dollars and cents.
