Hon John Marshalk The subject of this, sketch, the late John Marshall, Chief Justice of the United States, was a native of the sunny south ... SHe, was borne on the 24th of September, 1775, in Ferquer, Virginia, as tate noted as the birth place of many of the great men, who have adorned our, Republic .: Well may the Virginia mothers, as did the Roman, when asked for jewels, point to their sons. The father of John Marshall, socea pied a distin-guished position in the continental ar-my. He was well, known as a brave and patriotic soldier, and few men were more respected and beloved by the army than Colonel Marshall. The same pa-triotic spirit that throbbed in the father's bosom, found an echo in the son's, for we find that John at an early age entered the army, with his father, and fought for the same noble cause. He remained in the army for some time and his services being no longer needed, he left, intending to read law and to make that his future profession. "He therefore comunder the direction of a very distinguish-

ed lawyer, and was admitted to the bar in 1780. Ilis immenso mind at this early age, attracted the attention of the people, who in two years after his admission to practice, elected him a member of the Legislature of his native State. His legislative course was high minded and honorable. and he won the love and confidence of his constituéncy, and was continued, at intervals, for several years a represen-tative, in the Legislature. General Wishington, when President, offered Mr. Marshall, at different times the officos of Attorney, General and Minister to France, both of which he respectfully, declined; although within a year after the last offer he consented at the soligitation of President Adams to go as one of the envoys to the French Government. In 1798, he was elected a member of Congress; and in the sessions of '99 and 1800, he added largely to the great reputation he had already acquired. In May, 1800, he was nominated, Secretary, of Statel. On the 31st of Janary, 1801 he become Chief Justice, of the United States, and reflected credit and honor upon the station, by his legal acquirements, as well as his urbane, polite and truly republican manners Hercontinued in that office until his death. If not the first, he was certainly among the most eminent jurists, statesmen, and scholars our country has ever produced. His eminent qualities as a lawyer and a judge, were not surpassed by the good qualities of his heart.

Ignominious as these deaths are, they are considered as no disgrace among the Armenians. None of their community, they assert, is ever executed for a real crime; the true motive is the confiscation of their properties, nd some plausible axcuse is invented

Lord Bryon called them the "loveliest. spots on earth," in which opinion few that have seen them fail to coincide. The people of each faith in Constantinople, have distinct quarters alloited, to them in death as well as in life, The dark groves of cypresses, with their turband stones of white machie, belong exclusively to the Mosiems and many are the generations interred there.

A cypress is invariably planted at each Mussulinan's grave. The Tyrks reserve that funeral-tree for themselves and it is profibiled to be planted in othel vemeteries. As no grave is ever opened a second fime; these burial-grounds have become vast forests, extending for miles around the city and its suburbs. The cypresses here, from the nature of
