# TEMPERANCE IN PHILADELPHIA.

A friend has placed in our hands a Memorial of the friends of Tomperance in Philadelphia, to the Legislature, which contains some startling facts. It is therein stated that the quantity of ardent spirits and wines imported , into the port of Philadelphia during the, year 1849, and the first six months of 1850, was 1,418,330 gallons, valued at 741,125 dollars, while the importation of the same articles, during the years 1846, 1847 and 1848, was 1,-200, 420 gallons, at a value of 758,508 dollars. Thus it appears that in a period of eighteen months, more of these liquors have been imported, than there was in double the time before; and they urge as a fair inference that the present license system has greatly promoted the consumption and increased the importation as above. They state further, that prior to the 16th of April, 1849, the licensed houses for the sale of spirituous and malt liquors did not exceed seven hundred and fifty, and they now number two thousand four hundred and thirty-two. These are employed in selling domestic, as well as foreign liquors, mittis reasonable to suppose that the use of both has increased in a like proportion.


