To-day-most holders having sold up, there are no sollers at our lowest figures, and standard no sollers at our lowest figures, and standard brands are held at an advance, without finding buyers. The home demand has also been more active within the above range of prices, and finey brands at \$5,25(6) \$\mathbb{H}\$ bbl. Corn Menl is firmer, and about 3000 bbls. sold in lots at \$2,87\mathbb{H}\$ bbl. for Pennsylvania Meal, most of the stock being limited at that rate. Rye Flour is in-demand, and about 1000 bbls. sold mostly at \$3,50 \$\mathbb{H}\$. Dbl. The inspections of the week ending the 17th instant, are 12,399 bbls. Flour; 1101 bbls. Rye Flour; 604 bbls. and 50 hhds. Corn Meal. GRAIN—continues in good demand and the


