PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

Philadelphia N. American Office | Weekly Review, July 8, 1851. REMARKS.—To morrow being our Nation al Anniversary, and generally kept as a holi day, compels us to give the usual weekly review of the market one day in advance. Business since our last has been, as usual, very dull, but without any material change to notice in the leading articles, although under the influences of the late advices from abroad, the Africa, Cotton and Bread Stuffs were rather more firmly held; the demand, however, here more firmly hold; the demand, however, has continued limited at old prices.

FLOUR & MEAL—the receipts, which are still small, have been on the increase this week, but the stock is light, and the demand week, but the stock is light, and the demand of a very moderate character. Some 7000 bris Flour only having found buyers mostly at \$4,25 for standard superfine and selected brands, including some choice lots at \$4,31, and extra at 4,50@4,75 % brl. The market closes with rather more firmness on the part of holders, but with a limited inquiry for expert. The home trade have constant to a ort. The home trade have operated to a moderate extent within the above range of prices for common to fair mixed brands and extra, and \$5, 60,50 for fanoy family brands. Corn Meal has been in better demand, but at corn Meal has been in better demand, but at easier rates, and some 24@2500 bris Penn'a. Meal sold, part at \$2,87½; part a shade less, and one lot at \$2,75 Pbri, which latter rate is generally refused to day. Rye Flour is scarce with a steady but moderate demand, and 3@400 bris sold in lots at \$3,37½, including better brands at \$3,41 Pbri

GRAIN-With rather more arriving, and a moderate demand, has been near stationary, and 24@25,000 bushels Wheat sold, mostly Penna white, at 98@100c, as in quality, including some small lots of good reds at 94@95c.
Rye is scarce and wanted for distilling, with hye is scarce and wanted for distilling, with sales of 2@3000 buse, Penna, in lots at 71@-72c. Corn has been in steady demand, with sales of 30@35,000 bushels Delaware and Penn'a yellow at 63c, closing, however, rather dull. Oats are lower, with a limited demand; and 9@10,000 bushels Penn'a bold at 42% 43c, closing at 42 c.


