Miscellancous, SECRET HISTORY OF THE WAR WITH ENGLAND.

Col. Miller, of Vermont, who was ormerly a Representative in Congress from that State, is now a resident of Wyoming. In a speech recently delivered at Warsaw, Col. Miller revived a charge that has been often made, that our Government, though causing much blood to be shed in Canada, did no intend to conquer that territory, because by so doing, the free territory of the Union would be extended. In proof of this assertion, Col. M. says. that after General Hull was convicted by a Court Martial, of 'Treason and cowardice, and sentenced to be Shot,' he handed a letter to the President of the Court, which proved to be a letter from the Secretar of War, directing him to surrender h army to the British ! Col. Miller add

The President, Mr. Madison, stayed the proceedings of the Court, which left it in such a situation that any President, at any future time could issue an order for the fulfillment of the sentence

of the Court! Gen. Hull's oath as officer in the army of the United States, not to reveal his instructions from the War Department, prevented his defence, to the public, of this traitorous act! It hung over him up to the last hour of his life !-The fiat for his execution could have been issued at a moments warning, even to the day of his death!

Dr. Eustis remained at the head the War Department until the close of the year 1812, when he was succeeded by John Armstrong, who, of course became acquainted with the above matters. He remained in office two years when, incurring the displeasure of President Madison, he was removed. Mr. A. then presented to the Government a claim of some \$20,000—the payment of which was refused. Mr. Armstrong then published a pamphlet, entitled "Astounding Disclosures," containing the foregoing in relation to Gen. Hull the Government immediately purchased the suppression of the work, by the pay ment of Mr. A's claim, and ordered the whole edition to be destroyed. This, it was supposed, was done; three cop ies of it still exist-one, of which is in the possession of Col. Miller, another

VALUABLE HINTS. TWe glean the following from the Germantown Telegraph, contributed thereto by correspondents, who give evidence of thorough practical and scientific agricultural knowledge.]

Rats may be expelled from your cellars and granaries simply by scattering a few stalks and leaves of mullen in their paths. There is something very annoying in this plant, to the It affords, therefore a very easy remedy for the most perplexing evil, and much more economical and less troublesome than gunpowder, trat exterminator. cats or traps. The mullen is a very common production, and may be found in almost every field, as well as in pastures, and by the side of the highways.

Bones. - Save all the bones, and having mashed them, place there in a tub and pour over them a quantity of sulphuric acid. They will be dissolved, and may then be applied as manure to your turnip and other clops. Not a bone should be thrown away.

suffered to remain out as long as the ground keeps open. When there is a pretty lair prospect of its freezing, they may be removed. Both these vegeta-bles increase more rapidly in size after the advent of cold, than before. They also attain a certain crispness towards the close of the season, which they are destitute at the earlier seasons of their development.

Cabbages when removed to the cellar. should be immediately set out. A very slight sprinkling of soil about the roots. will cause them to keep fresh, and even to increase somewhat in size during the winter. It will also conduce consider-

ably to the savoriness as an article of food and retain them crisp and sweet .-Unfortunately all root crops and the cabbages is a failure this season, owing to the drought-however, these things can be stored away in the mind for another season.

Many of our readers can bear lestimony no doubt, in favor of the folshould be able to do so :- One of the best afficles that can be used for filling under beds, is the husks, properly prepared and stripped, of Indian corn .-Only the fine, interior husks, or those which are white and soft, should be used. Owing to their superior elasticity and durability, they make the very finest beds, and are much more comfortable in hot weather, than straw of stripped hazel, willow, or any other kind of wood. A bed of stripped husk will not require refilling for years. It may be well however to remark, that the husks should be well and carefully dried, before placing them in the beds, as the smallest degree of humidity will cause them to mould, and emit ar unpleasant and disagreeable oder, for weeks.

HOW TO MEASURE AN ACRE. The American armer gives the following directions for measuring an acre of land. The information will not only be valuable to farmers but to the reader generally.

Land 301 square yards make a Bouare rod : 4 square rods make one acre : 640 acres make one square mile; 4819 square yards or 169 rods make nere. in measuring an acre by yards. the u-ual practice is to trace of 79 yards in length and 79 yards in width palitis in a rough way may be considered near enough for practical purposes, but a 70 yards either way make 4999 square yards, it exceeds one sere by 69 square yards. Fo determine an accurate acre, it should be measured 78 yards in length by 66 1-7 yards in bredth. The sam result may be arrived at by medsuring 229 feet in length and 198 feet in width or by measuring 73 1- 3yards in length by 66 yards in brendth.

SMOKE HOUSES. Many persons commit great errors in building smoke houses. To be a nice, and a handsome and respectable appurtenance to a farm, "it must forsouth be built of brick or stone, with close fitting doors, and a single aperture for the egress of the smoke. The consequence is the meat is black and bitter, and might as well have been put in a pickle of pyroligneous acid; having lost its fine flavor, smelling of soot like a chimney sweep. The walls are so close and cold that the smoke condenses and set ? tles on the hams or bacon, and instead of drying, it becomes flabby and ill-col-ored. A smoke house can hardly be too open. It takes longer, to be sure, to perfect the process; but when completed, the meat is dry, of a fine chest-

nut color, and a delicate flavor of smoke penetrating the whole mass. The best houses we have seen, are built with a stone wall, three feet high, flagged bottom, and a wooden structure built on the top of the wall. Common siding is tight enough, or boarding endvise like boarding a barn is sufficient, with a light board or shingle roof. The bottom is used for an ash house and the smoke fire is built on the ashes. It is safe for both purposes, and will produce a much finer article for those who have a sweet tooth for that delicious treat-
