In like manner, as a manifestly indispensable condition of the perpetuation of the Union, and of the re-lization of that magnificent national future adverted to, does the duty be come yearly stronger and clearer upon us, as citizens of the several States, to cultivate a fraternal and affectionate spirit, language, and conduct, in regard to other States, and in relation to the varied interests, institutions and habits of sentiment and oninion, which may habits of soutiment and opinion, which may respectively characterize them. Mutual for-burance, respect, and noninterference in our personal action as citizens, and an enlarged exercise of the most liberal princicles of comity in the public dealings of State with State, whether in legislation or in the execution of laws, are the means to perpetuate that confidence and fraternity, the decay of which a

dence and fraternity, the decay of which a mere political union, on so vast'a scale could not long survive.

In still another point of view, is an important practical duty suggested by this consideration of the magnitude of dimensions, to which our political system, with its corresponding machinery of government, is so rapidly expanding. With increased vigilance does it require to to children to service a street of the service of the service. ly expanding. With increased vigitance does it require us to cultivate the cardinal virtues of public frugality and official integrity and purity. Public affairs ought to be so conducted that a settled conviction shall pervade the entire Union, that nothing short of the highest tone and standard of public morality marks every part of the administration and perishtion of the general government. Thus legislation of the general government. Thus will the federal system, whatever expansion time and progress may give it, continue more and more deeply rooted in the love and con-

That wise economy, which is as far removed from parsimony as from corrupt and corrupting extravagance—that single regard for the public good, which will frown upon all attempts to approach the treasury with insidious projects of private interests cloaked under public pretexts—that sound fiscal administration, which in the legislative de-parlment guards against the dangerous temptations incident to overflowing revenue and in the executive, maintains an unsleep ing watchfulness against the tendency o all nutional expenditure to extravagance—while they are admitted elementary political duties, may, I trust, be deemed as properly adverted to and urged, in view of the more impressive sense of that necessity, which is directly suggested by the considerations now

Since the adjournment of Congress, the Vice President of the United States has passed from the scenes of earth, without having entered upon the duties of the station to which he had been called by the voice of his countrymen. Having occupied, almos continuously, for more than thirty years, seat in one or the other of the two House of Congress, and having, by his singula purity and wisdom, secured unbounded confidence and universal respect, his failing health was watched by the nation with painful solicitude. His loss to the country inder all the circumstances, has been justly regarded as irreparable.

In compliance with the Act of Congress, of March 2, 1853, the oath of office was administered to him on the 24th of that month at Ariadne estate, near Matanzas, in the island of Cuba; but his strength gradually declined, and was hardly sufficient to enable him to return to his home in Alabama where on the eighteenth day of April, in the most calm and peaceful way, his long and eminently useful course was terminated.
Entertaining unlimited confidence, in your intelligent and patriotic devotion to the pub-

lic interest, and being conscious of no mo-tives on my part which are not inseparable from honor, and advancement of my country. I hope it may be my privilege to deserve and secure, not only your cordial cooperation in great public measures, but also those relations of mutual confidence and regard, which it is always so desirable to cultivate between members of co-ordinate branches of the Government.




