

of doubtful power, even under the pressure of the motives of expedient expediency and apparent temporary expediency.

The minimum of Federal government can path with the maintenance of national unity and efficient action in our relations with the rest of the world, should afford the rule and measure of construction of our powers under the general clauses of the constitution. A spirit of deference to the sovereign rights and dignity of every State, rather than a disposition to subordinate the States into a provincial relation to the central authority, should characterize all our exercise of the respective powers temporarily vested in us as a sacred trust under the generous confidence of our constituents.

In like manner, as a manifestly indispensable condition of the perpetuation of the Union, and of the realization of that magnificent national future adverted to, does the duty become yearly stronger and clearer upon us, as citizens of the several States, to cultivate a fraternal affection for the States, to conduct, in regard to other States, and in relation to the varied interests, institutions and habits of sentiment and opinion, which may respectively characterize them, with forbearance, respect, and noninterference in our personal action as citizens, and an enlarged exercise of the most liberal principles of comity in the public dealings of the States, whether in legislation or in the execution of laws, as the means to perpetuate that confidence and fraternity, the basis of which a more political union, on so vast a scale could not long survive.

In still another point of view, is an important practical duty suggested by this consideration of the maintenance of national unity, to which our political system, with its complex machinery of government, is so rapidly changing. With increased vigilance does it require us to cultivate the cardinal virtues of public frugality and official integrity. Public affairs ought to be so conducted that the public attention shall be directed to the maintenance of the highest tone and standard of public morality marks every part of the administration and legislation of the general government. Thus will the Federal action, wherever circumstances and progress may give it, continue more and more deeply rooted in the love and confidence of the people.

That integrity, which is as far removed from parsimony as from corrupt and corrupting extravagance—this integrity regard for the public good, which will frown upon any attempt to approach the treasury with insidious projects of private interests cloaked under public pretenses—that sound fiscal administration, which in the legislative department guards against the dangerous temptations of extravagance, and in the executive, maintains an unswerving watchfulness against the tendency of all national expenditure to extravagance—while they are admitted elementary political duties, they are also the most important ones advertised to and urged, in view of the more impressive sense of that necessity, which is directly suggested by the considerations now presented.

Since the adjournment of Congress, the Vice President of the United States has passed from the scene of earth, without having entered upon the duties of the station to which he had been called by the voice of his country. WARREN G. GIBBS, who has continuously, for more than thirty years, a seat in one or the other of the two Houses of Congress, and having, by his singular piety and wisdom, secured unbounded confidence and respect, his faithful discharge of health was watched by the nation with painful solicitude. His loss to the country, under all the circumstances, has been justly regarded as irreparable.


In compliance of the Act of Congress, of March 2, 1853, the oath of office was administered to him on the 24th of that month, at Arianee estate, near Matanzas, in the island of Cuba; but his strength gradually declined, and he was unable to return to his home in Alabama, where on the eighteenth day of April, in the next month and peaceful way, his long and eminently useful life was terminated.
