Seed Wheat .-- Preparation for Sowing.

The following article from the Mark Line (England) Express, is worthy the perusal of American Farmers :--

" A great consideration with the agriculturalist should be, to suit the variety to be sown to the condition and fertility of the soil. A rich soil should be sown with a short-strawed variety-a poor soil with a free growing long straw sort. The season of sowing should again decide as to the variety. White wheat should not be sown late in the season, or on very rich soil. The red wheat is befter adapted for late seasons and rich soil. The straw of the red wheat takes up more silies or flinty, nature than the white vericty; hence that brightness of the straw of the red wheat; this, of itself, is the great eause of its comparative safety from that destructive pressite mildew—that fungus plant so frequently found, growing upon the stalks of the wheat plant and preventing its further progress by taking all juisces designed for the support of the wheat to promote its own development.

Having thus shortly given some goneral outlines with the view of directing to a proper choice of wheat for seed, I will now offer a remark or two upon its preparation for seed. It has become a settled conviction in my own mind, that smut in wheat is mainly derivable from the smutty particles sown along with the grain, and by which it becomes tainted or impregnated. It is also derived from or propagated by saut deposited in the soil from any previous crop, such as black in oats, &c. -I have proof of this taint causing smut in more cases than one .-The great thing then is, to destroy the power or influence of this smutty dust-If this can be done without injury to the grain, all the better. Much loss has often ensued from the ineautious use of arsenie, ("white mercury") and sulphate of copper, ("blue vitriol.") The more simple the remedy, if effectual, the more desirable, and the greater the necessity for its adoption. Frequent washing in clear running streams of water is effectual; strong dressing with hot line is effectual. These are simple appliancesswimming in a brine, made of salt and water, has the two-fold effect and advantage of destroying the sinut, and floating off all impurities, seeds of weeds, &c.

There are innumerable specifics put forth for dressing seed wheat, many of which, no doubt are good and proper; and where any one has been adopted and practised with 'decided success, it would be bad policy to discontinue its use. own practice is very simple, easily effected. In the evening prior to next days drilling, as much wheat as may be required, is shot into a heap and well damped with water; it is left for a few minutes to imbibe the water, and then freely and profusely dusted over with quick-line-such dusting continued as it is repeatedly turned over. The heap is then rounded up, and left till morning, when it is put in sacks ready for drilling. Should the day prove unfavorable, the heap is spread thinly over the floor, and in this state it will keep for an indefinite period. I presume it is quite superfluous to intimate that all seed corn should be free from weeds; a good and cleanly farmer would thoroughly repudiate the idea of sowing seeds of weeds. I, however beg more attention to the point. Never make use of seed wheat containing other seeds. It is said that weeds prevalent in one district will not grow in another; don't try it -I know that the pernicious weed called . "Geldings," or "Gules," has been thus introduced into a district where, till lately it was unknown. 'Seeds will become habituated in any soil; therefore avoid them as you would'a pestilence. If, by some unforseen or geeidental cause, a farmer should be induced to make choice of a sample of wheat containing seeds, he should use every means to clean it. This may be pretty nearly effected by winnowing or swimming in a strong briny mix-

CHARCOAL FOR SWIND .- It is perhaps not generally known that one of the best - articles that can be given to swine, while -in preparation for the tub, is common charcoal. The nutritive properties are so great, that they have subsisted on it without other food for weeks together. The hog eats veraciously after a little time, and is never sick while he has a good supply.

HOOF BOUND OR TENDER FEET.

Cause of this is fever in the feet, founderyor gravel; the symptoms are hot feet and a drawing in one inch from the feet at the heels. Never have the feet spread at the heels nor rasped above the nail holes, for it will do the foot an injury .-Follow the directions given here. Use either the hoof ointment or the hoof liquid; apply it according to the printed directions. For hoof bound or tender feet, apply it all around the top of the hoof down one inch every third day; if for split hoofs, apply it every day. First have a stiff shoe on the foot, and cleanse the eut or crack. Never cut or burn for

HOOF OINTMENT. Take rosin four ounces, beeswax rix ounces, lard two pounds—melt together, pour it into a pot, and three ounces of turpentine, two ounces of finely powdered verdigris, one pound of tallow-stir all until it gets cool. This is the best hoof medicine for the hoof ever used. It is good for corks or bruises of the feet .-Follow the directions.

For tender feet, hoof bound, &c. Linseed oil, or neatsfoot oil, one-half pint of ricither, turpentine four ounces, oil of tar six ounces, origanum eighteen ounces; (shake this well and apply it as the directions for the ointment tells.
