

ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA.

Heart Rending Disaster at Sea.

LOSS OF THE STEAMER ARTIC WITH NEARLY ALL HER PASSINGERS AND CREW-THIRTY SAVED!

Halifax, October 10, 1854. The Carago steamer Canada arrived at this port this even ing. The most important intelligence is a heart reading narrative of the loss of the strainer Arctic with parly every soul of her large number of passengers and crew.

The collision occurred on the 28th of September, off Cape Race, New Foundland .-The Arctic was running at a speed of thirtren krots per Lour. A dense fog prevailed. While thus running she came into collision with a steam propeller, containing a regiment of British troops lately embarked from Cannda to join the army in the East. The shock of the collision was slight at first and did not cause much alarm. Soon however water commenced povring in at the Arctic's bows The panips were then put vigorously to work The water rapidly gained however and causel the estis suishment of the fire and the s'oppage of the engine.

The passengers formed in gangs to wor' the pump more viceroesly, but to no avail. The lifest sits were then let down and many of the passingers immediately reshed into them, leaving a few passengers and ship's or ficers behind. Signal gues were now fire and the construction of a rall commencest The most t callde panie now prevailed, and passengers rushed healling ever the balwarks in their facety. The raft was after wards seen with but one runn on it. Four hours after the collision occurred the Arctic went down, engulphed in the ocean, amidst the most piercing cries from those on board. The scene was truly horrible. The fate of the life boats is unknown. Thirty-two persons, mostly ship's company, were picked up by ship Lebanon and barque Huron. The Arctic left Liverpool with over 400 passengers and crew. Of this large number but thirty-two are known to be saved. The fate of the propeller, with the troops on board, is unknown. A more heart-rending disaster has never been recorded. It will fill with agony the hearts of scores of families in this country.

TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALI-FORNIA.

New York, Oct. 8 .- The steamship Northern Light arrived this evening about half past 10 o'clock from San Juan, with 498

On the ticket elected were twenty-seven names of Nuow Nothings, twenty being nom inces of the Whig and Anti-Broderick con ventions, and seven were nominations made by the Know Nothings only. Every man was elected, some having 1000 majority.— The Know Nothing vote is about 450 out of 11,000 in the whole city.
