Farmers Prospects for 1855.

What are the prospects of the farmers for the coming year, as to the probable crops and prices? In our opinion good in both respects.

First as to crops; it has always'been found that a season of severe drought had a beneficial effect on the soil, so that bountiful crops are pretty sure to be obtained the following year. (An explanation of this we cannot attempt now, but will in our next.) Besides the drouth of the past year taught some valuable lessons in regard to the importance of deeper and better tillage, which most farmers will put in practice the coming season .-(We shall say more about this, also, before long.) Then the hard times have hall the effect to drive men back to their farms and to industry, who before imagined that they were rich enough to live more genteelly, or smart enough to live more easily at other employment. This, together with the cheaper cost of labour, and the continual high price of farm produce, must toud to secure a large increase of crops the present year, supposing the season proves ordinarily favorable; and in regard to the great staple, wheat, alrouly in the ground, its present appearance is quite as good, we believe, as in the average of seasons.

Second, as to prices for the coming season; we think there is but little prospect of any decline from present rates, but much probability that prices will advance especially of such articles as are suited for exports. Of course it is impossible now to predict what will be the extent of the war movements in Europe the coming season, or to what extent this will create a foreign demand for our products; but from all that we can see at present we are of the opinion that all our surplus breadstuffs and provisions will be wanted to feed the armies and suffering people of other countries; and if our crops are abundant, the tide of gold and silver that has for the past year flowed so continuously from this country, will reverse, and with its return will come a return of prosperity and the redemption of, our public improvements.

Such are our hopes and expectations for the future; but these results can only be secured by industry and frugality, so we must all learn to labor and to wait for "good time coming, boys .-- Ohio Cul-

Best Vegatables for Milk Cows.

A correspondent of the Northern Farmer' says: The vegetable I wish recomend as the best, all things considered, for milk cows in winter, is white and turnips. Some perhaps will object to the turnip, because it will affect the taste of the milk and butter. So it does if fed raw. This can be avoided by boiling. For each cow boil half a pushel of turnips soft; while hot add five or six quarts of shorts, which will swell, and you will get the full worth of it. A mess like this fed to a cow once a day, will produce more milk of a good quality, than any other feed at the same cost. Turnips fed in this way do not taint either the milk or butter. One thing that may be said in favor of turnips as feed for cows, is, they can be sown in August, or as late as the first of September. I sowed some as late as the first of September last year, which were very fine. Turnips are also very profitable feed for pigs, when boiled in the way as for cows.

How MUCH LIME DO SOILS NEED. We have lately had occasion to remark that less lime is needed in soils than many suppose. Prof. Emmons, in his report on the Geological survey of North Carolina, says—"If we may appeal to observation and experiment, it is established that a s nall per centage of lime only is necessary to the highest degree of fertility; and yet this small per centage is necessary. If there is present one-half of one per cent, it seems to be sufficient; for it is rare to find a large quantity in productive soils." Prof. E. is a chemist and a geologist of long-experience and was one of the first (perhaps the first) to ascertain that some of the most productive soils for Wheat in Western New York contain camparatively little lime. - Boston Cultivator.


