

SUFFERING AMONG GERMAN EMIGRANTS.-Four families of newly arrived German emi-grants have been found in Allegheny city, Pa., who were in a shocking state of desti-tution. They landed at N. York, and had only money enough to phy their way to Pitts-burg. On the road the men denied themes food in order to give it to their wives and children. Nevertheless, four of the latter have died from suffering, and one of the men have been carried to the City Hospital in a hopeless condition.
