

STATEMENT OF THE FINANCES

OF THE COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND, FROM THE 1ST DAY OF JANUARY, TO THE 31ST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1854, INCLUSIVE.

Made by the Commissioners in compliance with the resolutions of the acts of Assembly of this Commonwealth, passed the 15th day of April, 1834, as also with the 37th section of said act which requires the County Treasurer once in every year to state his account and produce his vouchers to the Commissioners, which after examination by said Commissioners, shall be by them laid before the County Auditors for settlement, according to law.

In accordance with which N. W. Woods, Esq., Treasurer of Cumberland County, submits the following as a correct exhibit of his receipts and expenditures, for the past year, ending on the 31st day of December, A. D. 1854.

MILITIA ACCOUNT.

N. W. WOODS, Esq., Treasurer, in conformity with the 10th section of an Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act to revise the Militia System, &c.," passed the 30th day of April, 1853, exhibits the following account:

BOURGH ORDINANCE.—Be it Enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Carlisle, and it is hereby ordained and ordered in conformity of the same: That the fire plugs placed, or hereafter to be placed, in any of the streets, lanes or alleys of the borough of Carlisle, are to be used or opened only for the purpose of extinguishing fire, and if any person or persons shall open any fire plug or draw water from the same, or abuse or injure it, or any part of it, in any manner, he, she or they shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars. Provided, however, that it shall not be considered a violation of this ordinance if the fire plug and water be used by regularly organized hose or fire companies, they having first obtained the special authority of the Carlisle Gas and Water Company for the purpose.
