From the Country Gentleman. SMALL POTATOES FOR SEED.

Mr. T. C. Alvord of Wilmington, Ver-

"Some eight years since, at the time of planting my potatoes, I came short of seed o plant. Previous to this time, I had used large whole potatoes, or the seed ends cut off, for seed, and supposed that no other would answer. I resolved to try the experiment of planting small potatoes; the largest being about the size of common plums, but the most of them being smaller. I carried several bushels of these little things to the field, and commenced planting them, putting two to four in a hill.

"The potatoes in the different parts of the field came up at the same time, but the vines from the small potatoes were not as large and thrifty as those from the larger ones. At the first hoeing, there was some difference in the tops, but after that the tops from the small potatoes looked fully as well as sny of the field, and continued thro' the season. When I came to dig them, I found the potatoes, where the small seed was planted, to be as good, in every respect, as those-where the large potatoes were-planted. There were as many in the hill, and the potatoes were as large, and with as few

small ones, as those from the large seed. "Many of the farmers in this vicinity, after seeing the experiment fairly tried, are using small potatoes for seed. This winter I have had soveral applications from dealers in potatoes for seed, who inform me that the farmers whom they purchase from are generally adopting the way of using small potatoes for seed.

#### Is There no Danger of Over-Farming.

Tolebo, Feb. 26, 1855.

It is with regret I notice the general voice of the influential eastern press urging a removal from city and town to the country for the purpose of growing more food and bringing down its price. Is such advice needed at this time t. The crop of grain was cut short last year by drought to the extent of at least one hundred millions of bushels; an ordinary crop amounting to about nine hundred millions. This, with the European war, sufficiently accounts for high prices without charging them on the lack of cultivators. There is no such tack. One year with another, the prices of farm produce are scarcely more than barely remunerative.— For the last dozen years, taken altogether, farming has received less compensation for its labor and capital than any other great occupation. The last year is exceptional. With ordinary crops this year, prices will come down to a moderate remuneration.

Without being urged, too many men will fly to evils that they know not of, rather than bear the ills they suffer in the city .-Thousan is of laborers, last year engaged on the hundreds of railway lines now deserted, will necessarily swell the army of cultivators to an unwonted size. The high prices of this year will assuredly cause more extension and thorough cultivation, promising an extraordinary production.

The crisis we are in is something like that of 1837 and 1842-3, but it differs in many more points than it agrees with those periods of alarm and short currency. Thousands of mechanics and others who left the towns and went into firming in 1836, were glad to return after years of unaccustomed toil, to town life and their trades, there to meet competitors, who, by holding on at their posts, had greatly the advantage in

property and position.

The derangement of our monetary affairs has discreaged in a thousand ways the industrial operations of the country. This is not to be cured by a general rush into the country to cultivate the soil. Order will sooner be restored by every man standing in his accustomed place, and working at his accustomed occupation. Our people are too prone to change-to run after wild lands, imagining that quarter-sections are farms, whereas they are no more farms than a tree is a bureau. The low price of land is a perpetual premium and temptation. Added to this is the natural desire to hold dominion over the soil. Be assured that there is no need of arging men of other occupations to become farmers.

With two hundred and fifty millions of specie in the country, and with mechanical instruments of labor greatly increased during the past few years, with no diminution of industrial habits of our people, there seems no reason why confidence should not be speedily restored, and the various employments of men go on properly in their accustomed channel. ## Fattening Animals, with Cod Liver Oil.

The London Lancet gives an account of a series of experiments made by Dr. James Pollock, upon fattening animals with cod liver oil. They were conducted upon a three on. They were connected upon a large scale, and he found that pigs taking the oil ate less meal, weighed the heaviest and brought piere money per stone in the London market, the fat being firm and

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white. He fed from two ounces to a quarter of a pint daily, with good results; but when larger quantities were used the fat became yellow, and the flesh tasted fishy. He states that when sheep were fed once a day, the fat was beautifully white, and the flesh light and easy of digestion, and gave general satisfaction to the consumers. The general satisfaction to the consumers. The experiments with bullocks have been equally satisfactory. He feeds the bullocks with oil mixed up with meal and chaff; the pigs have it mixed with dry meal, the sheep split beans soaked in oil. The commonest oil costs in England about seventy-five cents per gallon, and the saving of expense is very considerable. Dr. Pollock also says that the relief to a wind-broken horse from the administration of cod liver oil is very soon perceptible. Whether these experiments are of any practical value to farmers in this country or not they are interesting, inasmuch as they show the importance of studying the application and physiological action of different food and oils in the ani-


