some valuable information in relation to idian Corn, and the extent to which it ras produced in the United States, is even in the last number of the Cincinpiti Railroad Record, The writer conands that Indian corn is the most imortant crop in the United States, and nat if the cotton were obliterated, it yould not work so much injury as the s of two-thirds of the crop of Indian orn. And yet the cultivation of maize s confined to a belt of about thirteen detrees. In fact three-fourths of the corn caised in the United States, is produced wtween the 33d and 43d degrees of latitude. Either South of the former or north of the latter, Corn is not a profitade crop. But little is raised in Europe, is the climete is not adapted to its culture. The product per acre in this counry, on good land, is about forty bushels, ud generally speaking, is the most cerin raised. In some of the Western tates, one hundred and fifty bushels ave been produced on an acre.

Time for Sowing Oats.

The sooner this crop can be got in afor the frost is out of the ground the beter. It is futile to attempt to prescribe by particular time to sow oats, the time just be determined by locality. As a eneral rule, it may be laid down that to proper time to sow oats is when the lowing can be well done.

Quantity of Seed per acre .- Not less nan two bushels of seed per acre should e sown on any ground fit for the culti-ation of oats. To sow oats on poor land, ithout manuring it is one of these facilties which delude but deceive one. To row a good crop of oats, naturally good and is necessary or land well manured, there it may not be naturally fertile.


