

The Chicago Riot.

CHICAGO, April 28 .- Nothing further of a serious character occurred yesterday or this morning. During yesterday, large crowds continued to collect, but they were dispersed by the police without difficulty. The military are still on guard at the Court House. The total number of arrosts already made is 55, and further trouble is apprehended at the examination of the prisoners.
