FLOUR AND MEAL.—The Flour market today was somewhat unsettled. We note sales of 350 bbls Howard street brands at \$10 62 1/2—a further decline. Also, 300 bbls City Mills at \$10 25, cash. A despatch was received on late 'change announcing that the steamer Africa was below Halifax, which tended to check further operations.

GRAIN.—Wheat.—The supply this morning was very light. Only about 2000 bushels in all offered. Market not so firm and sales small. We note sales of good to prime white at \$2 65 a 2 70, very choice do. at \$2 75, and red at \$2 50 a 2 55 to \$2 65 per bushel, as to quality. Corn—Market steady, but not quite so firm.
