LATER FROM EUROPE!

ARRIVAL OF THE AFRICA!

The Emperor of France in England!

THE PEACE CONGRESS.

HAMFAX, April 25. The Royal Mail Steamship Africa, Capt. Harrison, from Liverpool on the 14th inst., arrived at this port last night with one week's later advices from Europe.

THE VIENNA CONFERENCE.

The ninth conference was held at Vienna on the afternoon of the 8th, and lasted but one hour. The Russian plenipotentiaries had not received their instructions. Drouyn De L'Huys and Ali Pacha were present. Nothing whatever is known as to the chances of agreement, nor is it known when the next meeting will be held. It is rumored that the Western plenipotentiaries are about to quit Vienna; this, however, is considered doubtful. Everything at present seems at a stand still. New communications are spoken of with Prussia, but of what nature is not stated. It is said that Ali Pacha's instructions are to assent to the joint protestation to the great Powers, but nevertheless to express the regret that the Sultan's sovereignty was not re-established. The question relative to indemnity for the war is discussed.

THE WAR.

Nothing important had been received from Sebastopol up to April 8th. The position of both armies was unchanged. Night skirmishes on a small scale continued. The weather was fine and dry. An armistice of three hours was allowed to bury the dead. The Russians report themselves ready to open a general bombardment of the city. The Russians have constructed two new batteries, and have converted the ambulances into an advanced parallel. The French are advancing towards the Malakoff works by a serpentine sap. Omar Pacha had not marched on the Almas, as reported, but he occupied two villages, a half a league from Eupatoria, and had enlarged his circle of fortifications to shelter 5000 men. The Allies were sending him that number as rapidly as possible.

Ten thousand Egyptians had sailed for Eupatoria, and the French reinforcements and those from Sardinia would also land there shortly. An important statement is made, that the allies are changing their tactics in the Crimea, that they are about to fortify and hold, as a material guarantee, the already strong position of Kamiesch, with 20,000 men, supported by the fleets. The embarkation of the Sardinian troops would commence from Genoa on the 15th, in the English steamers, for Constantinople, and they would be re-embarked in thence for Eupatoria, to co operate with Omar.

General Canrobert's despatch estimates the loss on the night of the 22d—Russians, 700 killed, 1500 wounded; French loss, 200 killed, 400 wounded. The Russian agents at Vienna report a sanguinary engagement on the 26th of March, but advices from the Crimea do not mention such an affair. The Russian organs say that the women, children and sick are being sent out of Sebastopol, into the interior of the Crimea.

THE BALTIC.

A Russian despatch from Warsaw says an army of 120,000 men is concentrating in the Baltic provinces, and that three hundred guns are about.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Parliament is not sitting. It was announced on Friday afternoon, that the government had brought out a loan. The amount and terms are unknown, but the sum is supposed to be fifteen millions sterling. Almost immediately after the announcement, the funds fell to 91.

Napoleon and the Empress Eugene would reach London, Monday the 16th, and stay one week with the Queen. The tone of the British public is that of extravagant adulation in regard to the event, and it is very different to that which Napoleon was treated with some years since. The official programme is as follows:

Monday, Prince Albert goes to Dover to meet the august party. Lunches with them at the Warden Hotel. Arrives home with them at Windsor in the afternoon. Tuesday morning the Emperor receives the corps Diplomatique. In the evening he attends a grand entertainment. Wednesday—The Emperor will be invested with the order of the Garter. In the evening he will attend a grand dinner and ball. Thursday—The Emperor will visit the Crystal Palace, and in the evening attend the Opera. Friday—Napoleon will visit London to receive the city address, and afterwards dine at the Buckingham Palace. Saturday—The Emperor returns home.

The Roebuck Committee adjourned with Parliament till the 8th inst. The propriety of raising the siege of Sebastopol is freely and favorably talked of.

FRANCE.

The Paris Monitor contains a remarkable official document explaining the military conduct of the allied governments since the commencement of the war. Gallipoli was occupied to prevent the March of the Russians to Constantinople, but the retreat of the Russians to Silistria rendered the occupation of Gallipoli and Varna unnecessary. The allies being unable to operate in Bessarabia without the aid of Austria, the campaign against Sebastopol was undertaken so as not to remain inactive. The immense difficulties of the siege are pointed out, and Napoleon, who was the planner of the campaign, is exonerated. The document has caused much excitement, and is considered as an apology for raising the siege soon.

ITALY.

It is reported that the Duke D'Grammont, French Minister at Turin, will proceed to Rome, to mediate in the difficulty between the Pope and Sarhina. Napoleon has purchased estates in the Roman territory of Civita Nova. The Pope has had a narrow escape of a beam. Two cardinals were injured. Particulars not to hand.

RUSSIA.

Petersburg advices are altogether indefinite, as regards politics. They, however, reiterate that Russia will not make concessions. The cholera continues its ravages in St. Petersburg. On the 29th there were 200 deaths.
