

ARRIVAL OF THE ASIA.

A Protracted Conflict in Prospect.

NO HOPE OF PEACE.

pro pect of an assault. During the night of the 14th a most sangumary bittle raged between the French and Russians, in which the former detroyed the Russian rifle ambuscade in front of the Malakoff tower.

The latest accounts from Gortschakoff are to the 22d. They state that, after twelve day's bombardment, the fire of the Allies became weak, and caused but little damage.
