

# The Markets.

## BALTIMORE MARKET.

MONDAY EVENING, May 21.

REMARKS.—Business is steady, but without any special activity. Breadstuffs remain quiet, though holders are pretty firm. Buyers of Flour are disposed to hold off in expectation of a decline, whilst sellers are not inclined to concede. The supply and receipts continue moderate. Receipts of Grain are fair for the season but not large.

Flour and Meal.—The Flour market was very quiet to day, and no sales reported on change. Not much disposition the purchase. The recent rains, dissipating to some extent apprehensions of a short crop, and giving hope of an abundant harvest, have induced buyers to hold off. The very best accounts, too, from Europe, were not quite so favorable. Under these circumstances, purchasers are disposed to hold off for the present. There were sellers on exchange this morning of Howard street brands at \$10.87 1/2, but no buyers and no sales. City Mills were offered at \$10.75 per bbl., without finding purchasers. The market therefore closed rather dull. Rye Flour—supply very limited and holders firm; sales of 200 bbls during the close of last week at \$7.50 per bbl. Corn Meal—A good demand. We note sales during the latter part of last week, not heretofore noticed, of country at \$1.81, and city manufacture at \$3 per bbl. The same prices are contended for to-day, at which sales have been made.

Corn.—Wheat; the receipts are moderate and holders firm. About 3000 bushels in all offered this morning, and partly sold—good to prime white at 2 60¢ to 2 70¢, and red at 2 65¢ per bushel. Inferior lots 18 to 25 cents per bushel less. Corn—A steady demand. About 20,000 bushels offered on change to-day, and mostly sold—white at 1 05¢ to 1 07¢, yellow at 1 07¢ to 1 08¢ per bushel. No mixed offered. Oats—Market steady. About 1,200 bushels offered to-day, and sales of Maryland, Virginia, Pennsylvania and Ohio Oats at 60 cents. We quote the range at 60 to 66 cents per bushel. Rye—About 1150 bushels offered to-day, but no sales reported. It is not quite so firm. We quote Pennsylvania nominal at \$1.60, Maryland Rye at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per bushel.
