Monday Evening, May 21. REMARKS.-Business is steady, but with out any special activity. Breadstuffs remain quiet, though holders are pretty firm. Buyers of Flour are disposed to hold off in ex pectation of a decline, whilst sellers are not inclined to concede. The supply and receipts continue moderate. Recepts of Grain are fair for the season but not large.

The very test accounts, too, from Europe, were not uite so favorable. Under these circumcances purchasers are disposed to hold off or the present. There were sellers on exchange this morning of Howard street brands at \$10°87}, but no buyers and no sales .-Pity Mills were offered at \$10.75 per bbl., without finding purchasers. The market therefore closed rather dull. Rve Floursupply very limited and holders firm; sales f 200 bbls during the close of last week at \$7.50 per bbl. Com Meal-A good de-: land." We note sales during the latter part f last week, not heretofore noticed, of ountry at \$4.811, and city manufacture at \$5 per bbl. The same prices are contended or to-day, at which sales have been made.

CRAIN .-- Wheat; the receipts are moderate and holders firm. About 3000 bushels in all offered this morning, and parly sold-good to prime white at 2 60a\$2 70, and red at 2 65 per bushel. Inferior lots 18 to 25 cents per bushel less. Corn-A steady demand. Shout 20,000 bushels offered on 'change toay, and mostly sold-white at 1 05a\$4 07, vellow at 1 07a\$1 08 per bushel. No mixed offered. Oats-Market steady. About 1.200 bushels offered to-day, and sales of Maryand Virginia, Pennsylvania and Ohio Oats a 66 cents. We quote the range at 60 a 66 sents per bushel. Rye-About 1150 bushels offerel to-day, but no sales reported. It is ot quite so firm. We quote Pennsylvania nominal at \$1 60, Maryland Rye at \$1 45 a 157 per bushel.
