Section 2. All the provisions of the ordinances, or uts of ordinances regulating the inspection of weights, ales, beams and measures, used for the purpose of buy-g and selling, shall be extended to all such weights, ales, beams and measures as are used for the purpose charging for freight, tonnage, transportation, com-issions or other charges, where such charges are regu-ted by weight or measure.
