PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

MONDAY EVENING, Oct. 29.

Flour and Meal.—The Flour market continues scarce and firm, but the demand is limited, and sales only reach 250 bbls standard superfine at \$9, which is the uniform asking rate; and 300 bbls Mount Vernon Mills Bakers' Flour at \$9.25 the pair. For home use the sales are also limited within the range of \$9.10, 55 per bbl for common to choice brands and extra; the latter for fancy family Flour. Rye Flour and Corn Meal are quiet; 100 bbls of the latter sold at \$4.50 per bbl.

GRAIN.—There is not so much wheat offering to-day, and it is mostly of poor quality; the demand is also less active, and about 10,000 bushels found buyers at 1.95a\$2.00 for reds, the latter for prime Southern and Pennsylvania, including 2000 bushels Tennessee at the same rate, and about 3000 bushels white, in lots, at 1.95a\$2.12 for inferior to good lots. Rye continues unsettled and lower, and 1200 or 1500 bushels Western have been sold in lots, mostly at 1.20a\$1.21 delivered. Corn about stationary, with further small receipts and sales at 95 cts for old, and 65a70 cts for new yellow, according to condition. Oats in moderate demand, and 4000 or 5000 bushels Southern have been sold at 42 cts afloat.
