PHILADELPHIA MARKET.

SATURDAY EVENING, Dec. 17.

Flour and Meal.—The receipts of Flour continue to fall off, but the want of vessels and the unfavorable tenor of the late foreign news, have depressed the market, and some holders, in order to meet the views of buyers, have submitted to a further decline of 25c per bbl. Since the close of last week, the transactions, however, for shipment, reach some 15,000 bbls, mostly western, including some lots for future delivery at \$8 25a \$8 60 for standard and good straight brands, and \$8 75a \$9 per bbl for extra and extra family; at the close there is rather more firmness on the part of holders, who are less anxious to sell, our lowest figures being generally refused for fair shipping brands. Rye Flour is also lower, with small sales, in all some 200a 300 bbls, at \$6 12a \$6 25 per bbl. Corn Meal has been very dull, with sales of some 500 a 600 bbls, only to notice at \$1 for Pennsylvania.

GRAIN.—The receipts of wheat continue light, but the demand has fallen off, and prices favor the buyer; sales being confined to red, in small lots, at 180a200c, including 400 bushels prime at the latter rate. Nothing doing in white worthy of notice. Rye is rather lower, and 33a35000 bushels Western sold at 125c. Corn is more plenty, and the receipts, consisting of about 20,000 bushels now Southern yellow, part mixed and old, found buyers at 80a85c, about Oats in moderate demand, and about 300 bushels Southern sold at 40a42c, as in quality.
