BALTIMORE MARKET.

MONDAY EVENING, Jan. 7.

Flour and Meal.—The Flour market to-day was very much depressed in consequence of erroneous quotations of the Liverpool market per telegraph, and 500 bbls City Mills were sold at \$8, and some 1500 bbls more at the same price, under certain contingencies, showing 60 cents per bbl decline. There were also sellers of Howard street and Ohio at \$8.37. No buyers. When correct despatches came to hand of the Liverpool market holders were firmer, but no sales reported. A sale since change of 200 bbls Howard street at \$8.50. There were buyers of City Mills at \$8.25, but no sellers. The New York dispatch shows a decline to-day. Family and Extra Flour—Putnam Family is selling at \$11, extra do. at \$10.25; Howard street and Ohio Family at 10.50; \$10.75, extra do. at 9.12; \$9.37 per bbl. Rye Flour—We quote nominally at \$6 per bbl. Corn Meal—We quote country at \$3.87, City Mills at \$4.25 per bbl.

GRAIN.—Wheat—The market to-day was very much unsettled. About 2500 bushels (all white) offered, no sales and prices nominal. We quote choice white at 2.08; \$2.10, good to prime do. at 1.95; \$2.05. Red, good to prime at 1.90; \$2 per bushel. Corn—Only about 1200 bushels offered. Small sales of good to prime white and yellow at 75; 78 cents per bushel. Oats—About 600 bushels offered and sales of good to prime at 40; 41 cents per bushel. Rye—About 150 bushels were offered, and small sales of Pennsylvania at \$1.20. Maryland is nominal at 1.08; \$1.10 per bushel.
