The better grades are also sought after for export at improving prices. The local demand is more active. The sales of Western Canal are 14,500 bbls at \$8,06] a\$8,183 for common to good State and Michigan; \$8,25a \$8,62} for superfine Indiana and Upper Lake; \$8,371a\$8.811 for fair superfine to extra Ohio, and \$9.50a11,50 for extra Genesce.

GRAIN - Wheat - A good demand for Wheat for export and for milling, and, with light arrivals, prices are sustained; sales of 8000 bus. fair to good red Southern at \$1,90a1,95; and 8000 bus ordinary to good white Canadian at \$1,98a2,08. 


