## BALTIMORE MARKET.

MONDAY EVENING, Feb. 11.

**Flour and Meal.**—The Flour market this morning was dull and quiet, and we note a further decline. Very little disposition to purchase for shipment, except at reduced figures. Some purchases have been made recently to fill contracts, but most of this description of buyers are now out of the market. Sales late on Saturday, not heretofore reported, of some 300 bbls Howard street at \$8, a decline of 12 1/2 cents on previous figures. Also, this morning, 200 bbls do, at \$8, closing steady. Nothing done in City Mills or Ohio. We quote them nominally at \$8. Nothing done since change. The New York dispatch indicates a slight advance, but buyers were not disposed to operate. Family and Extra Flour—We now quote Patapsco family at \$10.50, extra do, at \$9.75; Howard street and Ohio family 10.37 1/2 to \$10.50, extra do, at \$8.50, \$8.81 1/2 per bbl. Rye Flour—Small sales at \$5.87 1/2 per bbl. Corn Meal—We quote country at \$3.44 to \$3.50, and city manufactured at \$4.25 per bbl. nominally. No sales were reported.

**GRAIN.**—Wheat—Market dull. Only 1500 bushels offered to-day, and prices irregular. We quote choice white at \$1.90, good to prime do, at 1.78 to \$1.90. Red, good to prime at 1.70 to \$1.78 per bushel. Transactions very limited. Corn—The market is dull and the samples on change are generally not in strictly desirable condition for shipment. About 15,000 bushels offered to-day, and partly sold, white, by measurement, at 68 to 69 cents, and yellow do, at 51 to 64 cents per bushel. Sales of yellow by weight at 66 to 68 cents; very choice, fully dry and in shipping order, will command more. Oats—About 1600 bushels offered to-day, and sales of good to prime at 38 to 40 cents; ordinary to fair do, at 34 to 35 cents per bushel. Rye—About 700 bushels offered to-day. A sale of 800 bushels Virginia by weight at \$1.13. We quote Maryland at 1.08 to \$1.10, and Pennsylvania at 1.15 to \$1.16 per bushel.

## Letter from Rev. John Chambers.

To a Member of the Legislature.

The following epistle will be read on account of its spicy sentiments. The distinguished author, who has received the sobriquet of "War Horse," for his fierce assaults upon rum, is known to have strong predilections for the cause of the "Democracy." In the campaign of 1854, he considered Bigler a better temperance man than Pollock. The Reverend gentleman is a violent temperance man, and at the same time a follower of the Democracy.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24, 1856.

My Dear Friend:—I see from the papers that the Democrats have to second reading a bill to repeal the restraining Liquor Law, and it is expected to-day the bill will pass the House of Representatives.

Now let me propose to you and through you to our party, that they forthwith pass a bill requiring the County Commissioners of each county in the State to have erected or placed at all cross-roads, a trough with a half a dozen or more mugs chained fast; and those troughs well and constantly supplied with rum and lager, that the thirsty whiskey-drinking Democrats may have their fill. The County need not be at the expense of fencing in the troughs, for there is not a dog on the old Keystone so far back to respect for this honorable hogship, as to put his snout within more than smelling distance of the vile drug.

It does not seem to me as though the Democrats were resolved that all the evils of intemperance shall be entailed upon this land perpetually. It is to me most galling and mortifying that the political party which I consider the true party of the country, should so identify itself with rum, rags and ruin. My dear sir, I most deeply regret that you, as a father, and a good citizen, should lend your influence to this vile traffic. It matters not in my judgment, how much of the rum-sellers money may pass from their pockets to those of the Democratic members. Now allow me to ask you, as an honest, clever fellow, have you ever known any good results to the individual, the family or the community, from rum drinking? Give me one example in which rum drinking has reformed one person. For thirty years I have been asking for this example, but so far in vain. Will you do me the favor to ask the Democratic members for one example? I ask it from the Democratic members of the Legislature, because it is evident to all who will see, that they are the friends of rum, and that rum is their friend. Surely they can say something good for their old friend. I presume Hugh will have High Mass performed for all the precious whiskey-loving souls in the Legislature. I trust in God that there is humanity enough in the Senate to stay the burning wrongs of the House.
