PHILADELPHIA Monday Evening Feb. 18. Breadstuffs generally, have been depressed by the unfavorable tenor of the foreign news, and the Market, for all kinds, is unsettled and drooping. Flour is without inquiry, and most holders are free sellers at \$7 50 and some at less, for standard shipping brands, but there is no demand for export: the home trade, also, are holding off, and there is little or nothing doing to establish prices. Corn Meal and Rye Flour remain very dull, and prices, in the absence of sales, are nearly nominal. Grain-The receipts of Wheat are light, but the millers are holding off for lower prices, and only a few small lots have been disposed of at 170 a178c, for fair to good Pennsylvania reds, and 185 a. 190c-for-white; Rve-is without demand-and no sales have been made to alter quotations .-Corn is lower; buyers are holding off, and the only sale we hear of, is about 1500 bushels Pennsylvania yellow, at 60c, in store. Oats sell slowly, at 41c fer Pennsylvania.




