No sales reported Jorn Meal-We quote country at \$3, city nanufactured at \$4' per bbl. Buckwheat. Menl-Sales-by-the-quantity-at-1-75a\$1-87, and in smaller lots at \$2 per 100 lbs.

GRAIN.-Wheat-Holders are somewhat irmer this morning; receipts light; and shipers are not much disposed to operate. Milers purchase freely. About 1700 bushels ofered, and sales of fair to good and prime white at prices ranging from 1 65 to 1 75a \$2.78, very choice do., for family flour, wil command \$1.80. Sales of red-\$1-60, and the range quoted at 1 58a\$1.65 per bushel, ar to quality: Oats-about 1500 bushels was offered to day, and sales of good to prime white' it 34a36cents, very choice at 37a39 cents per pushel. Rye-None offered to-day, and no , sales. We quote Maryland at 88a90 cents, and Pennsylvania at 96a98 cents per bushel.

COLLEGIATE REBELLION. The junior chivalry of South Carolina have been exercising themselves in care of a war for Kansas, and the students of the State College, at Columbia, have had a desparate rebellion and encounter with the police, in which several were killed on both sides. The military were called out and kept under arms for several days. The students despatched one of their number to . Charleston for the purpose of purchasing amunition, finding the citizens of Columbia would not sell to them. They also procured rifles from a neighboring town, under false pretenses, and were moulding bullets night and day. The Mayor having secured the key of their armory, they sent a messenger to him, stating that if he did not give up the key they would break open the armory. He refused to do so, and they broke it open and procured the weapons therein. The next day Gov. Admins went to the campus, and demanded the arms from the students, telling them if they did not surrender he would fire upon them. This being done, they gave up the arms. There was a College meeting held subsequently, and some of the students were expelled. The newspapers at Columbia have suidenothing about this affair, as they fear the students will be down upon them with "sharp sticks," but the Charleston Courier says Belloll, the Chief of Police, and three other officers were shot, and two of the students died of their wounds. The faculty of South Carolina College seem to have taught the "young ideas how to shoot !"

LATER FION EUROPE. By the arrival of the steamship Africa, at New York, we have three days' later intelligence from Europe .-She brings no tidings of the Pacific . The Peace Conference was to open on the 25th Alt. All the plenipotentiaries had arrived in Paris. Quite a sensation had been orented in Paris by the puclication in the Moniteur of an artical that appeared in the Siecle, which indicated that the policy of France and England wovld be identical in the Congress. Tho Rothchilds had taken the whole of the new loan at 90. There is nothing of interest from the Crimea.

Two PROPHECIES .- Lorenzo Dow, who possessed much common sense, and a queer way of using It, has it is said, left upon record two prophecies that are soon to be fulfilled! We will not wouch for the truth of them. He said that sometime in the month of March, 1856, we would have higher waters than has ever been witnessed since Noah's flood: The immense quantities of snow and ice seem to indicate that if they go away suddenly, Dow's prophecy may come true.—His next prophecy was that in the year 1860 there would be a bloody war between the Protestants and Ro man Catholics in this country, and that the Protestants would be victorious."

THE WISCONSIN GOVERNORSHIP. The Judiciary Committee of the Wisconsin Senate have made a report upon the contested eliction case between Baretow, the occupant of the Gabernatorial chair, and Mr. Bachford, the Resulting claimant, in which the whole question is elaborately reviewed. The Committee came to the conclusion that Mr. Bastford is cutitled to the office - having received ** 35,872-legal votes, against 25,623 for Bar-stow.






