We append the following synopsis of its provisions and will publish the entire bill, in our next :---

This hill is a very stringent one, and requires that the applicant for a license in cities and county towns must have four rooms and eight bede for the use of travellers. None but tavern-keepers can sell less than a gallon of spirituous liquors. Not more than one hotel to every one hundred taxables may be licensed in the cities, nor more than one to every hundred and fifty taxables in the county, to be apportioned among the wards of the cities, and boroughs and townships of the .counties, as the convenience and necessities of the public may require. All hotels, inps and taverns are to be classified and rated according to the estimated yearly rental of the house and-property. The first class, when the valu--ation is \$8,000, the rate shall be \$800, and so on down, in the same proportion, to \$25, except in Philadelphia, where the lowest rate of hotel license is fixed at \$75; in county towns and boroughs of over two hundred taxa bles, \$50; in the country, \$25.

One eating house to every four hotels may be licensed in the city and county, with the privilege to sell domestic wines and malt li-quors only-the license fee not to be less than \$50 in Philadelphia and Allegheny counties; and \$20 in other parts of the State.
