BALTIMORE MARKETS.

Flour and Meal.—The Flour market this morning was steady, but not active. Dealers are still disposed to hold off for more definite advices from Europe.

Wheat.—Holders firm to-day, and shippers and millers bought freely. About 6500 bushels offered to-day, and sales of 400 bushels red, prime, at 1.50a\$1.60, and 600 bushels of family flour white at 1.75a\$1.80.

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STILL LATER FROM EUROPE.

The steamship Canada arrived at Halifax on Friday evening bringing dates from Liverpool to the 15th inst. Mr. Dallas, the new Minister to Great Britain, had arrived out. It was generally rumored that the Treaty of Peace between the belligerent Powers would be signed on the day the Canada sailed.

LATER FROM CALIFORNIA.

The mail steamer Illinois arrived at New York from Aspinwall, bringing 1,200,000 in gold, and California dates to the 5th of March. The news possesses no marked interest.

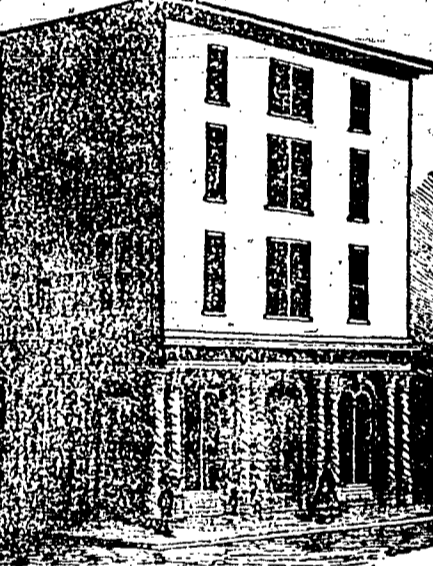

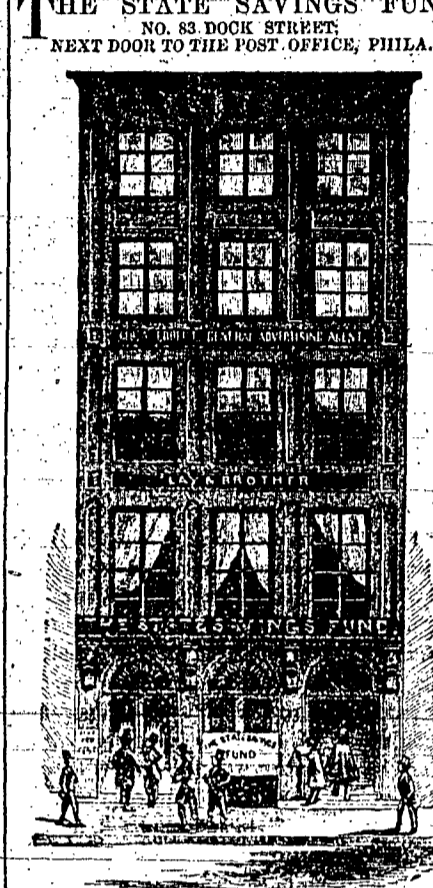

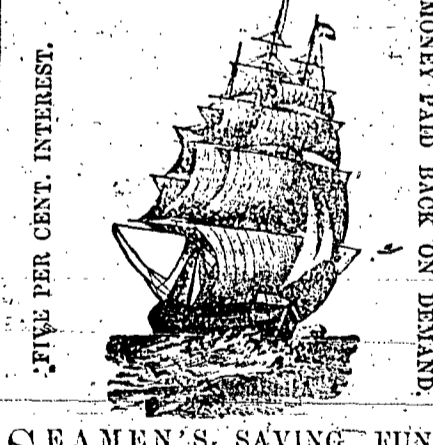
