### UNION STATE TICKET.

DR. JONAS R. McCLINTOCK, of Allegheny, whose term in the Senate expired with the last session, is spoken of in the West, as the next Democratic candidate for Governor.

MR. FILLMORE'S ACCEPTANCE.—The American Organ states that a letter has been received by a gentleman of Washington from Mr. Fillmore, in which he says he has not received the official announcement of his nomination; but that he is at the service of his friends.

LAND WARRANTS .- The total number of land warrants issued under the law of March, 1855, is nearly 127,000, requi--ring-upwards of fifteen millions of acres. The number of claims received is \$245. 700. Upwards of 14,000 warrants for 1,700,000 acres were issued during the month of April.

BILLS UNSIGNED. Gov. Pollock has not yet signed the general appropriation bill, the claim bill and the bill relative to libels, passed by the last Legislature. The Governor is absent from Harrisburg on a visit to his family in Milton. The appropriation bill contains provisions which would fully justify the exercise of the veto power.

ACQUITTALS.—Coburn and Drane who were tried in Dauphin county last week for alleged abstraction of muskets from the State Arsenal at Harrisburg, have been acquitted.

Charles Boughter, who was tried last week in Lancaster on a charge of embezzling the funds of the Lancaster Savings Institution has also been acquitted.

THE PHILADELPHIA CITY ELECTION took place yesterday. The officers chosen are a Mayor, to serve for two years; a City Solicitor, a Receiver of Taxes, and a City Controller, each to serve for two years; a City Commissioner, to serve for three years; twelve members of the Select, and eighty-five members of the Common Council, in addition to various other subordinate officers. Three tickets were in the field, American, Locofoco and Republican. We shall thus be able to know the strength of these various organizations by the result of the poll.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.—The National Convention called by the Republican Executive Committee, to which all opposed to Slavery Extension are invited, will be held in Philadelphia on the 17th of June next. We observe that in some of the neighboring counties in this State movements are already being made to respond to the invitation of the Committee, and meetings have been called to consider the propriety of sending delegates. No action, that we are aware of, has yet been taken in this county, as there is no local Republican organization.
