TO BRIDGE BUILDERS.—Propo-

sals will be received at the Commissioners' Office, at the earliest opportunity, by the 1st of May, 1856, for building a wooden bridge over the Conestoga River, at Quigley's Mill, in Hopewell Township. Said bridge to be built on the abutments of the old bridge, the dimen-sions in length and width to suit the old abutments—150 feet from abutment to abutment—the height to be twelve feet from the floor to the square of the roof; said bridge to be built of good material; the frame to be of white pine, and of sufficient size for strength and durability; the arches to be of white pine, and so constructed as to effect the strength or durability of the bridge; the wooden arches to be closely weather-boarded with three-quarter inch white pine boards, well lapped, and the whole of said bridge to be roofed with a good quality of white pine shingles; the roof to extend at each end of the bridge two feet over the head of the arches, and to be weather-boarded on each end two feet, so the bridge to be built double thickness, according to the dimensions required by the initial promise of the workmanship of said bridge. The contractors to have the old bridge, &c.
