RAILEOAD LAW.—The English law goes much further than ours, in protecting Railroad interests. But it is also much more stringent in enforcing upon Railroad Companies a strictcompliance with their engagements. The Munchester Guardian notices a curious trial in that city, in which damages were recovered from a Railroad Company for delay. The action was brought by Mr. Gibbs against the Lancashire and Yorkshire Company. The following is the report !

"Mr. Fernly stated the case for the plaintiff. He said Mr. Gibbs was a metal dealer in Wolverhampton, and some time since, havto go to Newcastle upon-i tant husiness, he took a ticket at Manchester, and proceeded by the train which left Manchester at 5 o'clock in the morning, and which was advertised in the company's bills to acrive at Newcastle at 111. It appears there was no time lost when the train reached Northampton, but between there and York there was considerably delay, and on getting to the latter place the plaintiff found that the Newcastle train had left half an hour, and he had to remain for the next, which was a slow train, and did not arrive at Newcastle before .... 44 in the afternoon, which was too late for the plaintiff to transact the business upon which he came, and he claimed £6 for the expenses of the journey and £4 for loss of time. Mr. Cobbett, for the defendants, contended that the company were not liable, as it was not on their line the delay took place; but his Honor overruled the objection on the ground that the company granted a ticket through to Newcastle. Mr. Cobbett then addressed the jury" in mitigation of damages, and his Honor having summed up, the jury retired, and in about half an hour returned with a verdict for plaintiff for £10, the amount claimed.
