FLOUR-The market is more active, and holders are obtaining rather better prices; sales include some, 500 bblg common mixed brands at \$6; 1000 bbls straight do at \$6 121 which is now the general asking rate; 200 bbls fine at \$5 122; 450 bbls better brands, Dart extra off, at \$6 25; 200 bbls extra at \$6 50; 500 bbls Pittsburg City Mills extra at \$6-75; 700 bbls extra family at \$7, and 600 bbls middlings at \$8 871 per bbl, the market closing firm, and with few if any sellers at our lowest figures; for home use the demand is also better within the above range, of prices for common to choice brands and extra, at \$7 50 per bbl for fancy lots. Corn Meal is more inquired for, and holders are rather firmer in their views: sales reach about 1200 bbls Penna Meal, in lots at \$2 50 and 1000 bbls Brandywine at \$2 871 per bbl.


