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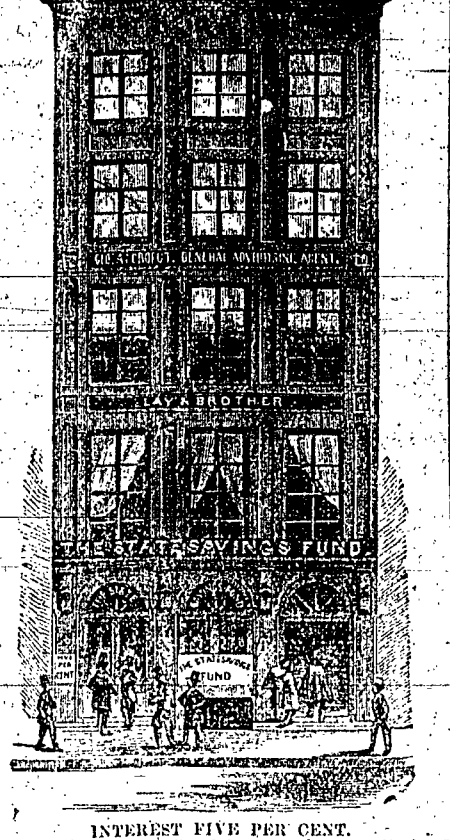
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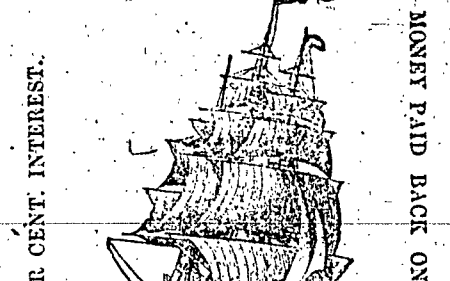

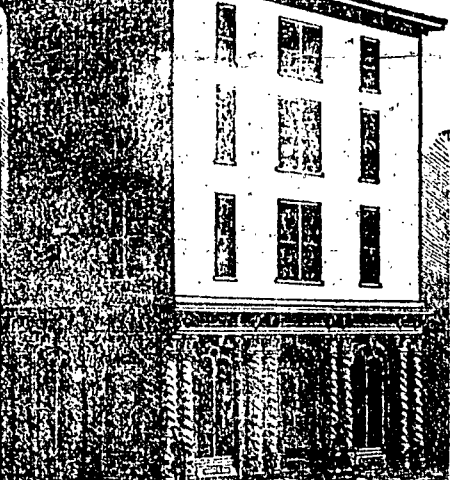

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Palmer, the Poisoner.

The English and continental papers come to us filled to repletion with the evidence given in the extraordinary case of Palmer, of Rugeley, who was then on trial, for poisoning Mr. Cook, a well known sporting character. The peculiar circumstances connected with this trial warrant, in the strongest degree, the notoriety which has been given to it.

The trial had been in progress four days when the steamer left, and the testimony of the witnesses for the prosecution went to show that all the symptoms attending the death of Cook were similar to those produced by strychnine, but that the chemical analysis had failed to detect the presence of that poison in the part submitted to examination.
