





Palmer, the Poisoner.

The English and continental papers come to is filled to repletion with the evidence given in the extraordinary case of Palmer, of Rugeley, who was then on trial for poisoning a Mr. Cook, a well known sporting character. The peculiar circumstances connected with this rial warrant, in the strongest degree, the notoriety which has been given to it. The sudden death of Cook gave rise to suspicions, which, if verified, will stamp Palmer with the informous reputation of having equalled in his . 28 cold-blood murders the execrable Brinvilliers, and other poisoners, whose names stand out so-prominently in the French-Criminal Galendar. In addition to the various persons who are allleged to have fallen victims to his diabolical compounds, and whose lives he had previously insured, this man stands charged with having forged his mother's name on various bills to a large amount, and in the face ... of the greater crimes imputed to him, the lesser one is not disputed.

The trial had been in progress four days when the steamer left, and the testimony of the witnesses for the prosecution went to show that all the symptoms attending the death of Cook were similar to those produced by strych nine, but that the chemical analysis had failed to detect the presence of that poison in the part submitted to examination. When the steamer left, the defence were producing witnesses to prove the ease with which strychnine could be discovered, if that deleterious drug . had been administered; and from the equally high professional standing of these gentlemen, and the entirely opposite views they entertain to those advanced by the principal ,witnesses. for the prosecution, an impression prevailed govern that the criminal would yet escape the extreme penalty of acts which very few doubted he had really committed. Though tried only for the murder of Cook, he stands charged with haying compassed the death, by similar means, of his own wife, to whom he owed his fortune. and station in life, of his brother, and of the late Lord George Bentinck. The forgery of his mother's name he attributes to his decease! wife, admitting his own cognizance of it, but he denies the more atrocious crimes, and is said to stand at the bar with a confidence and calmness which only an innocent man, or one of extraordinary nerve, could possibly exhibit.

Profanity is the least ducusable of all ices because it has not even the poor apology of self interest to defend it. It gratifies no appetite and subserves no end, and must, therefore, spring alone from the most criminal thoughtlessness, or from unmitigated depravity. A practice thus characterized by no virtue and furnished with no excuse, springing from the two worst conditions of the human heart, absolute vacuity or total repletion with wickedness, is too monstrous to be loved and too worthless to be practised, and should be hated by every good man, and avoided by all.
