The Flour market continues dull, there is little or no demand for export, and standard brands were freely offered at \$6 per bbl. without finding buyers, except in small lots; some 2000 bbls only were disposed of, mostly for home use, at \$6n6.25 for standard and better brands; selected lots sell as wanted by the retailers and bakers at \$6 50, and extras at \$6 75a7 50 and \$8 per bbl, seconding to brand, the latter for fancy family flour. Rye Flour is dull and nearly nominal at \$3 50 per bbl. Corn Meal is steady at \$2-50 per bbl. for Pennsylvania Meal; some holders ask more; a sale of 200 bbls Brandywine was made at \$2 871 per bbl.

GRAIN-The receipts of Wheat continue moderate, but prime lote, which are scarce, only are saleable at previous prices; some 2000a8000 bus, have been disposed of at 140a 148 cents for good to prime red, and 150a160 cents for white, including 1800 bushols of the latter, prime Southern, at 157c, 4000 bus. grown Pennsylvanian do, at 185c, and some small lots inferior red at 110c. Rye is in steady request, with further sales of 800 bus. Pennssivania at 72a73c, the latter affoat, and some small lots of Southern at 70 cents. Corn is in better demand, with sales to the extent of 4000a1200 bushels mostly prime Southern yellow, at 51 cts, including damaged at 40a46 cents, and a lot of white at 50 cents, afloat. Outs are in steady demand, and about .3000-bushels sold at 34c-for-prime Jersey and




