The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in reven rus, or to meet -o-pousses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether ountracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the Genaral Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed soven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts,
