RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as ARTICLE XII.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the Senate, Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to defray the present or future expenses of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in section one and two of this Article, no debt whatever shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and the additional debt, contracted as aforesaid, the Legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of any stocks owned by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State; not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of insurrection, or invasion, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in the extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Section 5. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township, or of any corporation or association; unless such debt has been contracted to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the State in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness.

Section 6. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

Section 7. There shall be an additional article to said Constitution, to be designated as ARTICLE XIII, as follows:

ARTICLE XIII.
