clothed, and feel the responsible position. they occupy as citizens of a republic des. tined to act a conspicuous part upon the

theatre of the world, and upon which is east the task of solving the problem of a nation's self government. Providing an

abundance for the subsistence of all, byan improved system of husbandry, is one of the means that must unite in the accomplishment of this purpose. Where

will we find a class of men who are firmer supporters of law and order, of education,

and the institutions of religion, than these? Exempt from the feverish Lxeitement and sudden emotions which effect men gathered in cities and villages, all public measures are coolly viewed and tested by sober reason; and they will ever remain the firmest bulwark of our liberty and our national honor.

Farmers' sons, do not rashly forsake the calling of your fathers -The day has. fairly arrived when agriculture does not mean manual labor; but full scope is given for the whole powers of the mind as well as body to expand, and the exertious of the latter, directed by the former, are doubly rewarded. It rests with you, by a more thorough questioning of nature, by experiment, to develop more fully and perfectly the great principles of animal and vegetable life ; and thence-to eliminate a more successful practice, and by noble efforts to render agriculture what it is so often called-the most honorable employment of man. To accomplish these objects, will be no idle pastime. Both mental and bodily powers must be called into exercise.—As the body is strengthened and qualified-for-labor-by practice, so the mind needs training to develop its full powers .--- "Knowledge is power," although a familiar adage, yet none the less worthy of consideration. You need not only a familiarity with the theory and practice of agriculture, and with the kindred sciences, but the whole tield of knowledge should be explored as far as your opportunities will allow. The retired country merchant, or the professional man, often make the very best farmers. And why? Because they bring to the work minds accustomed to reason, # connect cause and effect, and thus suc ceed, though they may be ignorant of. many of the minor details of the busi ness. Learn early to apply the maxim of Dr. Franklin, "that time is money." Dc not acquire a habit of jounging about the stores or public places in the evening, or othor seasons of leisure. Much self-denial will be required to counteract such habits when once formed; and if indulged, how many hours will thus be consumed which should be devoted to business or the acquisition of useful knowledge, or the instruction and train-ing of your children. To manage aright the fragments of time-broken days and cold spells, which frequently occur-reguires even more tact and forethought than it does to conduct the operations of a large farm in the harvest seasons when many hands are employed. No one can direct others aright to save all odd more ments, who does not first know how to use his own to the best advantage, and many trifles which tend to perfect the labors of the year will thus romain neglected. In conclusion, young men, and farmers' sons in particular, whose especial birthright it is, we advise you to neek your support from the soil as producers. and not more speculators and consumers, to aid in developing the agricultural resources of our country, which form the Fat. 13, 50.-47. 
