From the California Christian Advocate. TEMPERANCE TESTIMONIAL.

REV. I. S. DIRHL, P. G. W. P. S. of T.

This apostle of Temperance leaves Sacramento to day for the Bay, preparatory to eaving on the next steamer for the Atlantic He goes home as a delegate to the National Division, to be held in June next, in Lexington, Kentucky.

Brother Diehl came to California in the spring of '53, and in October commenced his labors in the Temperance work. In this cause he has labored for the last two years, and worked with a zeal and devotion never surpassed. It is estimated that he has tray elled twenty-five-thousand-miles, delivered six hundred Temperance lectures, organized one hundred and fifty divisions, pe organized ten, and taken into the Order of the Sons of Temperance over eight thousand members. Besides his labors in the cause of Temperance, he has served the Church as Sunday-Sebool and Tract agent, thus giving to many destitute portions of the State religious liter-

On Monday evening last, Bro. Diehl' friends determined to give him substantial evidence of their high appreciation of his labors in the Temperance work. A goodly number of the people assembled at Rev. Mr. Benton's church; after addresses by Rev. G. B. Taylor and Rev. Mr. Phillips, Gen. Winn presented Bro. Diehl, through Hon. Messrs. Welty and Stewart, a gold-headed cane, and a purse of gold containing \$260.

The Diehl Demonstration, as published came off last Monday night, Col, D. W. Wel ty acting as master of ceremonies. The Rev. Mr. Baker commenced the evening's exercises by prayer. The Rev. B. G. Tay for was then introduced, and in his usual in teresting style addressed the assembly for nearly an hour. The Rev. G. S. Phillips followed in a few but very appropriate-re marks. Gen. Winn then spoke for a few moments, and presented a cane from Diehl Division No. 221, with the following appro - printe remarks:

BROTHER DIEHL—I am requested by Bro. T. L. Benham, W. P. of Diehl Division No. 221, to present you this cane, as a testimo nial from himself, the members of his Division, and other friends of yours, who have with so much pleasure contributed to pro cure it.

The timber in it was taken from one of the timbers of Major-General Sutter's mill at Coloma; which was in process of building at the time gold was first discovered in Cali fornia. The gold was dug from our mines -and it was manufactured by one of our own mechanics. Brother, may this staff support you through life; ever reminding you that your self-sacrificing devotion to the good of mankind has won the esteem of your numerous friends, who feel that you have done more to advance the cause of Temperance in this State_than any other man in it.

Mr. Diehl received the cane sitting, and returned thanks in a low tone, being too unwell to respond in any other way.

5 Gen. Winn then proceeded to make his report to the Committee, using the following

Welty: WORTHY BROTHERS-Some time previous to the sad accident that occurred in the explosion of the steamer Belle, Pacific Star Division No. 1, had determined to make an effort to raise the means necessary to defray the expenses of Brother I. S. Diehl, as a Representative to the National Division of North America, he having been unanimous ly elected as such, at the last annual meeting of the Grand Division. The faithful, energetic, and eminently successful labors of our most distinguished Brother, had entitled him to this high honor at the hands of his co-laborers in the cause of Temperance, but the very serious injury received, rendering it impossible for him to be of any further ser vice in the field of active labor which had been assigned him by the Grand Division at once determined the prompt action on our part in carrying out the original plan.— That plan was plain and simple. Gen. Reddington authorizes me to say, that from his private funds he will to-morrow present to Brother Diehl two hundred and fifty dollars. This act of benevolence on the part of the General is worthy of all commendation, and for which he has the sincere thanks of Bro. Diehl and his numerous friends.

Col. John H. Stewart received the purse on the part of the Committee, in a very neat and appropriate address, and then placed it in the hands of Col D. W. Welty, W. P. of Division No. 1, who made the following remarks and presented it to Mr. Diehl, who accepted with thanks, etc.

WORTHY BROTHER :- In view of the many of the many and invaluable services rendered by you in the work of Temperance and moral reform in the State of California; as a mark of appreciation of those services and their friendship for you as a man, believingthat the best interests of our Order would be promoted thereby, and your usefulness increased, your brothers composing the Divis ion of which you are so worthy a member, originated the enterprise of raising the necessary means to send you as a delegate to the National Division of our Order, to meet in Kentucky in June next. 🤏

For the purpose of conferring honor upon one to whom honor is due, at a regular meeting of said Division, held in their Hall on the 13th of November, 1855, as has already been stated, passed by unanimous vote the following preamble and resolutions:

It is proper that I should here state that those resolutions owe their paternity to one now present who has labored with assiduity and perseverance to carry them out, and who is himself one of the pillars of our order and a champion of the Temperance cause.

It was appropriate that this enterprise should originate in the pioneer Division of the State. Here the seeds of Temperance reform were first sown; here its germ first broke the incrusted surface and looked out upon the world of intemperance by which it was surrounded—and here was first com-menced in this State the mighty work of Temperance reform. 
