



FLOATING ISLAND .- We remember our first ight and taste of this delicious compound .--And we remember a twelve year old girl flying into our presence with cheeks as red as roses, crying out I've learned how to make floating island !'-- She found the way at her first effort! How eagerly she watched every mouthful with sparkling eyes as one and auother pronounced it good! But here is the receipt. Set a quart of milk to boil, and then stir into it the beaten yolks of six eggs; flavor with lemon or rose, and sweeten to taste; whip the whites of the eggs to a strong froth. When the custard is thick put it into a deep . dish, and heap the frothed eggs upon it .-serve cold.

TAPIOCA PUDDING --- And who is there that hath not grown kindly over a dish of Tapioca boiled or baked? We prefer the former when prepared in this way; Wash the tapioca well and let it steep for five or six hours, changing the water three times. Simmer it in the last water until quite clear, then season it with sugar and lemon juice.

COFFEE .- Thick as mud!' muttered the husband of a shiftless wife who never made good coffee. How is it that at C.'s and B.'s we always get such delicious coffee. Clear as amber, dashed with real cream, it is a dish fit for the gods-but this!' and a wry mouth, made in expressive silence finished the remark. Germantown Telegrayh. TO PRESERVE GOOSEBERRIES.

Take full grown gooseberries before they are ripe, pick them, and put them into wide mouthed bottles, cork them gently with new soft corks, and put them in an oven, from which the bread has been drawn, let them stand till they have shrunk nearly a quarter; then take them out and beat the corks in tight cut them off level with the bottle, and rosin them down close. Keep them in a dry place. CHERRY MARMALADE.

R movert e stones and stems from the cherries, and rub the cherries through a seive, add to this result a little current juice, may half a pint to every three pounds of cherries; put the whole over the fire, stirring into it three quarters of a pound of sugar to every pound of the fruit, and boil it until it becomes a thick jelly; pour it into jare or moulde, and when it is cold, spread on the top of each jelly a paper dipped in brandy, cover each jar or mould tightly, and keep it in a cool and dry place until it is wanted.
