Section 1. The State may contract dobts, to supply casual deficits or failures in reyon tos, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dellars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

In addition to the above limited power the State may contract dobts to repel invasion, appress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other nurrose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt—whatever shall be created by or on benalf of the State.

Sections 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaid; the Legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty flicusand deliars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned by the State, to gether with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, insurrection or invasion, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in the extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced belog the sum of the Elmmonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual; company corporation, or associativn—nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become, joint owner or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation. or stockholder, in any company, association, or corpora-

Sec. 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereot, of any country, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress demestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness.

Sec. 7. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or interported district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.
