-New-York, July 8, 1856. GENTLEMEN-You call me to a high-responsibility by placing me in the van of the great movement of the people of the United States, who, without regard to past differences, are uniting in a common effort to bring back the action of the Federal government to the principles of Washington and Jefferson. Comprehending the magnitude of the trust which they have declared themselves willing to place in my hands, and deeply sensible to the honor which their unreserved confidence in this threatening position of public affairs implies, I feel that I cannot better respond than by a sincere declaration that, in the event of my election to the Presidency, I should enter upon the execution of its duties with a single hearted determination to promote the good of the whole country, and direct solely to this end all the power of the government, irrespective of party issues and regardless of sectional strifes. The declaration of principles embodied in the resolves of your convention expresses the sentiments in which I have been educated, and which have been ripened into convictions by personal observation and experience. With this declaration and avowal, I think it necessary to revert to only two of the subjects embraced in the resolutions, and to those only because events have surrounded them with grave and critical circumstances, and given to them especial simport.

I concur in the views of the convention leprecuting the foreign policy to which it ad verts. The assumption that we have the right to take from another nation its domains because we want them, is an abandonment of the honest character which our country has acquired. To provoke hostilities by unjust assumptions would be to sacrifice the peace and character of the country, when all its interests might be more certainly secured, and its objects attained by just and healing counsels, involving no loss of reputation.

International embarrassments are mainly the results of secret diplomacy, which aims to k op from the knowledge of the people the operations of the government. This system is inconsistent with the character of our institutions, and is itself yielding gradually to a more enlightened public opinion, and to the power of a free press, which, by its broad dis emination of political intelligence, sequres in advance to the side of justice the judgment of the civilized world. An honest, firm and open policy in our foreign relations would command the united support of the nation, whose de-

liberate opinions it would necessarily reflect. Nothing is clearer, in the history of our institutions flan the design of the nation, in us certing its own independence and freedom; to avoid dving countenance to the extension of slavery. The influence of the small, but compact and powerful class of men interested in slavery, who command one section of the country, and wield a vast political control, as a consequence, in the other, is now directed to turn this impulse of the Revolution, and reverse its principles. The extension of slavery across the continent, is the object of the power which now rules the government; and from this this spirit has sprung those kindred wrongs in Kansas, so truly portrayed in one of your resolutions, which prove that the elements of the most arbitrary governments have ments of the most arbitrary governments have more been vanquished by the just theory of, our rown. It would be out of place here to pledge myself to any particular policy that has been suggested to terminate the sectional consideration. to turn this impulse of the Revolution, and iny self to any particular policy that has been suggested to terminate the sectional controversy engendered by political animosities, operating on a powerful class banded together by a common interest. 
