DESOLUTION PROPOSING A-MENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth artistic thereof

FIRST AMENDALENT.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as ARTICLE XII.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply causal deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall inversexeed severation and fifty thousand debts, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained; or to repay the debts so contracted; and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repul invasion; suppress insurrection, defend the State in War, or to redeem the present outstanding indetedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt whateyer shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as alresaid the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund which shall be sufficient to pay the works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the Income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sluking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the axes, or other revourse of the State, not required for the ordinary
