RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

SECTION 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts and contingencies, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the repayment of such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war, or to repel the claims of any person or persons, or to discharge the public debt; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. The credit of the State shall not be loaned in any manner, or for any purpose, to any individual, company, corporation, or association, or to any stockholder in any company, association, or corporation.

SECTION 4. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt of any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the State to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, or to discharge any portion of its present indebtedness.

SECTION 5. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of the citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECTION 6. No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one-tenth of its population (either to form a new county or otherwise), without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

SECTION 7. The Legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be in the public interest so to do; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporations.
