

DESOLUTION PROPOSING A MENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF

Resolved by the Senate and Houss of Representa f the Commouncalth of Pennsylvania in Ger of the Commonneath of Fennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are a reposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

There shall be an additional article to said Constitu-tion to be designated as ARTICLE XII. OF PUBLIC DUBTS.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revoucies, or to meet—expenses 1 of otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the denoral Assembly or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and

contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and lifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the dobts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

In addition to the above limited power the State may contract dobts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such dobts, shall be applied to the purpose whatever.

To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaid the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and, annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and firty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the not annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, to gether with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, insurrection or invasion, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in the extinguishment of the pub Individual, company corporation, or association; or association; on shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

SEC., 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, horough or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable

The Legislature shall not authorize any country, city, berough, township, or incorporated district, by wirtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, the come a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for or lean its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.
